Help stop the spread of COVID-19

If you have any of these symptoms, you and members of your household should stay at home. Most importantly, you must book a COVID-19 test. As a critical workers, staff of Cardiff and Vale UHB can access testing directly via the Health Board. Just speak to your line manager about booking one.

As Health Board employees, we should all be aware of our personal responsibility in the fight against COVID-19. By following a set of simple rules, we can all make a significant contribution to controlling infection rates. I would urge all staff to be very aware of how they interact with others throughout their working day and beyond this in their social time. We all have a critical role to play in our united fight against COVID-19.

It is very important that we respect the guidelines and requirements and take personal responsibility for our actions in order to reduce transmission rates and keep ourselves, our families and our patients safe.

Progress of Lakeside Wing, UHW

As I mentioned last week, the first phase was handed over to the UHB by Darwin Group Ltd on 25th November, the same day in which the first fully operational 56 beds were ready to accept patients. This week, we're aiming to have the full 166 beds available to accept patients. Employees from across the Health Board have spent their time and shown sheer determination on this project alongside their main roles which I'm extremely grateful for and proud of. Beat flu

Our staff flu vaccination programme continues and I am delighted with the number of people coming forward to receive their flu vaccination. Last week, our data indicated that 61.3% of health board staff had received their flu jab and I would like to pay tribute to all staff involved in the delivery of this programme for their determination and hard work.

61.3% of all staff in Cardiff and Vale UHB have been vaccinated against influenza so far this season



Our flu champions are now offering immunisations to all staff (including non-front line workers) and I would urge staff members to contact their Clinical Board Flu Lead or access an Occupational Health clinic through our phone first system. Call Internal 43264 or External 02920 743264 in advance to book a slot at UHW. Social distancing is controlled at all clinics in order to safeguard both staff and clients.

Each staff member receiving a flu vaccine in work is eligible to be entered into our weekly prize draw. Congratulations to Cath Byrne from Specialist Services clinical board who was our week nine winner and received a £50 John Lewis voucher.



Five years of deemed consent to organ donation in Wales

This week marks five years since a soft optout system for organ donation was implemented in Wales, which means that consent of the donor is assumed but families have the final say. Since the introduction of the legislation, consent rates in Wales have risen significantly, rising from 58% in 2015, to 77% in 2019. Wales has gone from having the lowest consent rates in the UK to the highest.

Wales has paved the way in the UK as the first country to implement such legislation, but this year Scotland and England have also moved to a soft opt-out system, presenting the potential to significantly increase the number of donor organs available across the UK. In the past 5 years, Cardiff and Vale UHB has also made other notable strides in organ donation and transplantation, such as being the first centre in the UK to transplant kidneys from donors infected with Hepatitis C thanks to the access to treatment. Before the availability of DAA tablets on the NHS to treat and cure Hepatitis C, people infected could not donate their kidneys. It is estimated 12,000 people are affected by Hepatitis C in Wales. I would like to take this opportunity to commend our Nephrology and Transplant team on their continued hard work to make strides as a leading centre in the UK.



Bevan Exemplar Showcase

Since the launch of the Bevan Exemplar programme, Cardiff and Vale UHB has been fortunate to have a number of innovative and inspirational members of staff be part of it every year. Despite the fact that this year's showcase is online, this remains the case as we have a number of fascinating projects being presented. The first was called <u>Get Up and Dance</u> led by Marianne Seabright in partnership with Rubicon Dance, which was presented earlier this morning. The project, aimed at dementia patients, used weekly dance classes and music to lift the mood, promote wellbeing and get people moving in hospital to aid recovery.

This Friday morning, two more of our exemplar projects will be presented as part of the showcase and I would highly recommend watching if you are able.

The first is <u>Grow Well</u>, led by Isla Horton, Grow Cardiff and Dr Karen Pardy, Director SW Cardiff Primary Care Cluster, Cardiff and Vale UHB. The second is Needle in a Haystack: Finding glaucoma patients that are going blind, led by Wai Siene Ng.
