A big thank you all for your continued hard work and commitment as we experience continuing high demand for our services, alongside the additional demands of an increase in community transmission of COVID-19 and the consequences for patient presentation and team sickness absence.

As a result, I ask the public to please be patient, please be kind to the team and please help us to help you where you can. If you do not need to visit the Emergency Unit you can access advice and health care from a community pharmacy for most minor illnesses and the NHS 111 Wales online symptom checker holds a wealth of advice for many conditions.

As we are set to experience a period of hot weather I would also ask that you please look after yourself and others, particularly infants and young children, the vulnerable and the elderly, and follow health advice including wearing sun protection, staying hydrated, keeping out of direct sunlight between the hours of 11am and 3pm and wearing loose clothing.

Last week the Health Board hosted the Minister for Defence, People and Veterans Leo Docherty MP and the Veterans' Commissioner for Wales James Phillips at the University Dental Hospital. The veteran population in Wales is large with diverse needs that span physical and mental health. Some are treated by the Veterans Trauma Network Wales which was established in 2019

here in Cardiff and the Vale UHB by a team of colleagues including regular military clinicians. It ensures that the most severely injured veterans living in Wales have equitable access to appropriate specialist care for their injuries. Cardiff and Vale UHB is also home to Veterans NHS Wales which treats and supports veterans with mental health needs

It was interesting to find out more about the service and discuss ways in which we can raise veteran awareness across the organisation, facilitate collaborative working with our partners and offer more to support the needs of veterans to improve their experiences and overall wellbeing.

In partnership with independent charity, <u>Defence Medical Welfare Service</u>, we are currently recruiting for an Armed Forces Covenant and Veterans Healthcare Collaborative Lead to work within the healthcare setting to provide a world-class, responsive medical welfare service to veteran service users and their families. These are important roles that support the close collaboration between the Health Board, local government and the third and private sector to meet veterans' health and mental healthcare needs.

Thank you to Ed Chapman and the Clinical Engineering team who warmly welcomed me along to their department last week where I got to understand more about the innovative



work that's being done. In total the Clinical Engineering team maintains around 50,000 items of medical equipment which is incredible, and they play vital role in providing lifecycle support to the Health Board every day, all year round. Update on Pentyrch GP Practice

Cardiff and Vale University Health Board would like to thank Eluned Morgan, Minister for Health and Social Services, for her careful consideration around the concerns raised on the location of GP services for residents of Pentyrch and the surrounding areas. The decision made by the Minister will allow us to move forward with the plans for delivering high quality services for residents of this area.

As a Health Board, we are committed to providing quality services that meet the needs of the local population and we will take on board the recommendations made to improve services for the local community.

We value the input of the Community Health Council and acknowledge that scrutiny and challenge plays a vital role in the continued development of services and their role is instrumental in helping us deliver the best possible health services within communities.

While we appreciate that change can be unsettling and understand the mixed views from the patient population on the proposed new site, we believe this is the best outcome for the community and medical practitioners of Pentyrch and the surrounding areas.

We are looking ahead to the delivery of these new facilities and will continuing to work closely with the CHC around the transport provision. We will continue to keep the local community up to date with plans and progress around the new facilities.

Bowel Cancer Screening - Artificial Intelligence

Supported by the National Institute of Health Research and Wales Cancer Research centre, and hosted by Cardiff University, Cardiff and Vale University Health Board is leading a landmark clinical research study. The Future of Real Time Endoscopy Artificial Intelligence (FORE AI) research is being conducted within the Endoscopy Unit at University Hospital Llandough, led by Professor Sunil Dolwani, and is aiming to demonstrate the benefits of using artificial intelligence in colonoscopy bowel cancer screenings.



Colonoscopy is an important tool for the identification and removal of pre-cancerous and cancerous polyps, but its effectiveness and quality are highly dependent on polyps not being missed during examinations.

With this in mind, the clinical research study is looking into using computer assisted detection and diagnosis systems to act as a second pair of eyes during procedure and uses artificial intelligence to identify the polyps in images. If successful, the research aims to better patient outcome by improving detection rates, offer an improved patient experience by providing an instant diagnosis and increase operational efficiency within units by accurate pathology identification at the time of the procedure.

First baby born in Wales using new climate-friendly gas and air technology

In a first for Wales, Anne-Marie Leaman recently gave birth to baby Hudson using new climate-friendly gas and air technology. Cardiff and Vale University Health Board (UHB) is committed to embedding sustainability into healthcare systems, the use of the new green technology marks a significant milestone in reducing nitrous oxide emissions.

Nitrous oxide is commonly used in healthcare for anaesthetics but despite being a critical part of healthcare delivery, it is considered a harmful greenhouse gas. Studies show nitrous oxide has more than 265 times the global warming potential than carbon dioxide (CO2).

Entonox, commonly known as gas and air, is a combination of nitrous oxide and oxygen. In Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan, the use of Entonox is equivalent to emitting 4495 tonnes of CO2 every year which is comparable to driving 930 times around the world in a petrol car. Entonox Carbon Reduction Units which have been developed in Sweden are able to collect exhaled nitrous oxide and 'crack' it into nitrogen and oxygen which are deemed harmless.

Cardiff and Vale UHB has worked closely with patients and staff on the implementation of the Entonox Carbon Reduction Units. Patients and staff have demonstrated great enthusiasm and commitment towards reducing environmental impacts and embracing new methods of care

The Entonox project forms part of wider activity to reduce the use of nitrous oxide across Health Board sites.



There are currently four nitrous oxide manifolds across the Health Board's sites which are the typical method of storage. Findings by a Cardiff and Vale UHB multidisciplinary project team have identified wastage from this type of system can be high due to leaks and loss of gas from the supply. The Health Board has trialled portable nitrous oxide cylinders at the Children's Hospital for Wales as part of an individual pilot which has increased efficiency considerably, from 2.5% to 74%.

Following the successful pilot, the team scaled the pilot study across the organisation through The Spread and Scale Academy, with ambitions to share insights and encourage change across Wales. To date, the Health Board's University Hospital Llandough site has fully decommissioned its nitrous oxide manifold and plans are underway to decommission the main manifold at University Hospital of Wales.

The Healthcare Without Harm Report says 5.6% of UK emissions are from healthcare settings and the NHS Wales Decarbonisation plan highlights anaesthetic gases reduction. The Health Board has projected savings of 1.15 million litres of nitrous oxide or 679 tonnes of CO2e each year which will play a huge part in making healthcare more sustainable in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan and beyond.

Charlotte Oliver, Consultant Anaesthetist and one of the Clinical Leads for the project at Cardiff and Vale University Health Board, said: "I'm really proud of the hard work the team has put in to get us to this point, challenging norms of care that have been around for decades and allowing us to bolster our commitment

to reducing our environmental impact. We recognise we still have a long way to go in our Shaping Our Future Sustainable Healthcare programme but are delighted with the progress we are making and the enthusiasm to adapt from our colleagues and patients."
