Following the COVID-19 pandemic, I was delighted to learn that I had been awarded a CEO UK Award from CEO Today UK Magazine, which you can read about here. This is, of course, an honour that I share with everyone who had worked in Cardiff and Vale UHB throughout my time here and throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. Your contribution was invaluable and I know that I could not have done it without you, whoever you are, wherever you're based, and whatever your role is.

I am part of the team at Cardiff and Vale, just as you are, and although I will be leaving the UHB (and do so with a heavy heart), I know that every single person working at the Health Board will continue to achieve great things from what we have worked together to put in motion over the last four years. COVID-19 Vaccine Update

Our vaccine programme has been continuing at pace and we are now inviting people aged 18-29 to our centres. Our Bayside Mass Vaccination Centre is now a dual site which can offer both Pfizer and the Oxford AstraZeneca vaccine.

We have now delivered 421,493 vaccinations to our population with 305,171 people having received their first dose. That's an amazing 75% of our adult population. Further 116,304 people have now received both doses, so 29% of our adult population in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan is fully protected.

t is great news that we are moving through our second dose delivery. People will receive their second dose at 11 weeks after the first, for both Pfizer and Oxford AstraZeneca. People will be invited by letter to attend their second appointment. Your second dose will be the same as the vaccination you received for your first dose.

The JCVI guidance now confirms that women who are pregnant can now receive the vaccine and, in Cardiff and Vale, this will be the Pfizer vaccine. If you receive your appointment and you are pregnant please contact us to let us know so that we can ensure you are booked into the correct site.

Clincial Trial

Our Bayside Mass Vaccination Centre is also the only centre in Wales recruiting volunteers for a study looking at the use of COVID-19 vaccines at the same time as the seasonal influenza vaccine.

This study is sponsored by University Hospitals Bristol and Weston NHS Foundation Trust and is running in Cardiff & Vale University Health Board.

If you are aged 18 years or over, and have had your first AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine and have received an appointment letter for your second AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine, then you may be eligible to take part in the study.

In Wales, progress is accelerating across rare disease, cancer and pharmacogenetics services as well as pathogen genomics and we are witnessing how this is increasingly transforming patient care and I remain confident that greater transformation will be seen over the years to come.

Continuing to work from home where possible

As we continue to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, I would like to urge staff across the Health Board to continue to work in an agile way, and do so from home wherever possible while continuing to meet the needs of the organisation. Mangers should work with their teams to enable home working wherever possible, as it has a number of benefits such as reducing the amount of time spent commuting and our collective carbon footprint.

Managers should also ensure that staff are able to maintain a healthy work-life balance, something that is incredibly important as we continue to adjust to a life and a pace of work after COVID.

One year of video consultations

We have recently passed the one year milestone since we introduced the NHS Wales Video Consultation Service here at Cardiff and Vale. In that time, more than 30,000 video consultations have been held by services right across our organisation, which adds up to more than 16,000 hours of appointments.

The service has quickly become integral to how we interface with our patients, offering them flexibility to see their clinician from the comfort of their own home or without having to leave work, and has played an important role in facilitating social distancing at our sites during the COVID-19 pandemic through limiting visitor numbers. That in turn has contributed to reduced traffic, parking issues and CO2 emissions in and around our sites.

There have been a number of innovative uses of the video consultation service, including Children's Speech and Language Therapists using video consultations to overcome the barriers of delivering services with PPE, and endoscopy consultants giving immediate second opinions on unusual or complex cases remotely, without having to change into scrubs or don PPE.

<u>Collaborative</u> <u>working</u> <u>across</u> <u>NHS</u> <u>organisations in Wales</u> has also been enhanced by the service, which has helped to <u>drastically reduce travel for clinicians</u> <u>delivering regional services</u>.

We've been planning to introduce video consultations for some time, to offer healthcare sustainably, closer to people's homes. We know that they don't suit all circumstances, but our clinicians are still exploring how we can get the best out of them, driving forward a valuable service for as many patient groups as possible.

I would like to thank all involved for ensuring the successful introduction of the video consultation service, and look forward to seeing its growing use in the months and years to come. A new way of working with Consultant Connect

Consultant Connect has been endorsed by the Welsh Government as part of the continued development of technology solutions for facing crisis. It has been available to clinicians within CAV since June 2020, giving GP's and AHP's rapid access to Secondary Care consultants for telephone advice guidance. It provides immediate rapid phone advice for GPs and specialist teams, accessible via a free App or unique surgery dial in. Consultant Connect offers three communication options; phone and IG Compliant photos and messaging with all data stored in a secure cloud. There are now over 25 specialty lines set up in CAV.
