Dear Colleague,

This week I'm sure you will have all felt the impact of the local lockdown in Caerphilly and the request for us all to wear facemasks while on site in certain communal areas. There is no escaping the fact that with the flu vaccination programme about to be launched, winter is fast approaching and things are starting to ramp up.

This week we made a number of significant announcements. We officially launched the Major Trauma Centre as part of the Major Trauma Network, as well as a 400 bed temporary surge hospital to be built onsite at UHW to enable us to cope with a second wave of COVID-19 and winter beds.

In June, we had details from Welsh Government on the modelling predictions of a second wave and like all other health organisations globally, we have been putting plans in place to ensure that we are as ready as possible. The building of a temporary surge hospital will enable us to be prepared, providing the intense and clinically challenging treatments and rehabilitation that those who experience the ill effects of COVID-19 need.

We are aligning our operational and recruitment plans with the modelling predictions and trajectory of the virus, which means we will continue with our plans to de-commission the Dragon's Heart Hospital seamlessly with being able to accept our first patients at the surge hospital. Many of you will remember that we already have built in additional capacity across our whole UHB estate in order to provide further bed capacity and meet the demands of both COVID-19 and winter.

Yesterday, I attended a COVID-19 feedback session which was attended by around 120 staff. This was an opportunity to thank staff for their work during the pandemic, as well as a chance for staff to give feedback regarding lessons learnt from COVID-19 – thank you to everyone for their contributions.

I recognise that many staff and patients are already feeling fatigue by what lays ahead. But we are all in this together and it is important that as we build up our resilience towards the peak around December time, that we continue to take personal responsibility, wear masks where appropriate, socially distance and keep ourselves updated on the latest Welsh Government Guidance.

Please, listen and act on the latest guidance in order to stop the spread of COVID-19 and keep your patients, families and colleagues safe.

# Major Trauma Network goes live

Monday saw the official launch of the South Wales Major Trauma Network which will treat seriously injured patients from across South and West Wales and South Powys.

We held a virtual launch event where speakers from each part of the patient journey were invited to speak and the network was officially launched by Minister for Health and Social Services, Vaughan Gething.

UHW is home to the Major Trauma Centre which is the first one in Wales and this is a milestone for patients who require major trauma care in the region. The role of the Centre in caring for seriously injured patients is key as part of the wider network in delivering improved outcomes and survival rates for patients across the region.

At the Centre patients will receive 24/7 consultant led lifesaving interventions and treatments and benefit from the right care in the right place. They will have access to experts including specialist nurses and therapists to get them back to the best possible health, and enabling treatment and recovery to take place closer to home as they move through the Major Trauma Network pathway. The Major Trauma Network has Major Trauma Units in each Health Board area so that patients can continue their recovery journey closer to home. Swansea Bay UHB will also provide the plastics and burns expertise as part of the service.

The team has worked tirelessly to get to a go live stage and there has been a significant amount of work undertaken to deliver this vital service especially with the huge challenges more recently with the COVID 19 pandemic. The team also learnt from Major Trauma Centres and Networks across the UK to develop the right service for our population. A big learning point was the inclusion of rehabilitation and therapies to enable a patient to get back to their former selves as much as possible and this is a big component of what the network will offer in each Health Board area.

I would like to thank Cardiff and Vale colleagues and those across the network who have worked collaboratively with us. It has been a fantastic opportunity to work together and we look forward to this continuing as we develop and improve care for the patients within the network region.

# Surge inpatient facility announced

On Monday, Health Minister Vaughan Gething announced £33m in funding for a new facility at University Hospital of Wales to manage any potential increases in COVID-19 cases this winter. The new facility will be a modular build next to the main hospital and will offer 400 additional beds.

The announcement follows the news that Dragon's Heart Hospital at the Principality Stadium will begin to be decommissioned. The new build will take shape simultaneously as Dragon's Heart Hospital is decommissioned.

The funding announcement is welcomed and will support our planning for increased capacity in response to current modelling predictions and anticipation of a second spike in COVID-19 cases and hospital admissions.

As a health service we will take on board all of the learning from Dragon's Heart Hospital in terms of design and clinical requirements for a surge hospital and work to the national modelling requirements.

#### Update on face coverings in healthcare settings

Following the updated guidance on face coverings in public places (*Face coverings: guidance for the public* Welsh Government Sep 2020), staff, patients and visitors **must** wear a face covering in all indoor public places around all health premises. This includes all corridors, waiting areas, concourse, reception areas, restaurants and shops at our hospital sites.

Face coverings will not be needed in office environments (to include open plan office spaces) where 2m social distancing can be maintained. Where you cannot maintain this distance a face covering must be worn. You must also wear face coverings in corridors and stairwells in our offices, such as Woodland House. Please note that the wearing of face coverings is not a substitute for 2m social distancing and this should be observed wherever possible.

There is an expectation for people to have their own face coverings as they need to be worn in all public places. However, if members of staff, patients and visitors do not have access to a face covering these can be provided in the immediate term. If you use a single-use face covering please dispose of it appropriately in a bin or discard when you get home.

We understand there will be occasions where people are exempt from wearing face masks due to a health condition. We would ask staff and the public to be mindful of this and our values and behaviours when challenging individuals who this may apply to.

Our staff must remember to wear the correct fluid repellent mask (not face coverings) when caring for patients in the clinical settings.

#### Beat Flu 2020/21

Next week will see the launch of the annual Beat Flu campaign which will run through the autumn and winter season. As ever, the aim of the campaign is to reduce the impact of flu on the population of Wales by encouraging those who are eligible for a free annual flu vaccination to get vaccinated in a timely way.

#### Staff vaccination programme

Protecting our health and the health of those around us is more important than ever this year and getting a flu vaccine is a key part of this.

<u>Clinical Board Flu Leads</u> across the Health Board have worked hard to prepare for this year's staff flu vaccination to ensure the vaccine is available to our staff as early as possible. Many staff across all areas of the Health Board have volunteered to undertake the role of Flu Champion in their clinical areas to improve access for staff to obtain their flu vaccine.

The Chief Medical Officer has emphasised the importance of healthcare staff accessing the flu vaccine in a timely manner this year. We would like to see front line staff working in areas where our most vulnerable patients are cared for, getting their flu vaccines as a priority. We all have a duty of care to ensure we do everything we can to protect ourselves, our patients, our colleagues and our families this winter as flu circulates alongside COVID-19 in our communities.

From **23**<sup>rd</sup> **September**, the flu vaccine will be available to 'Flu Champions', enabling them to offer vaccinations to all health board staff. I would encourage all staff to identify the 'Flu Champions' in their area to check their availability and arrange for a vaccination to be administered.

We plan to hold a drop-in flu immunisation session for staff later this month (dependent on evolving public health advice) and will share further detail as soon as it is available.

#### Flu vaccinations in the community:

The Health Board works closely with our partners in Primary Care to ensure that individuals identified as being most at risk of experiencing complications from flu can access free flu vaccinations across Cardiff and the Vale, in their GP practice.

In addition to healthcare workers, the eligible groups identified this year are:

- Children aged two and three (age on 31 August 2020)
- Primary school aged children
- Pregnant women
- People aged 65 and over
- People from 6 months of age with long term health conditions
- Adults with a BMI of 40 or above
- Care home staff with regular client contact and domiciliary carers
- Carers
- People living in Care home or other long stay facilities
- Members of Voluntary Organisation

- Community First Responders
- Household contacts of people on the NHS Shielded List

Individuals aged between 50 and 64 years of age will only become eligible for a vaccination in November, dependent on additional vaccines being made available.

Individuals falling into one of these groups can access flu vaccinations from their GP surgery, Community Pharmacy, or school as appropriate.

Children 2, 3, & 4 years of age and those home educated can access the flu intranasal vaccine form their GP. All primary children will be offered vaccination in school by the school/immunisation nursing team.

As a tribute to World Patient Safety Day in the fight against the pandemic, our Health Board and local councils are lighting up some key sites in orange on Thursday evening as a reminder to our wider community that by following coronavirus guidelines you can help us to care for you. These sites include; UHW, UHL, City Hall and St David's Hall in Cardiff, the tunnel between Broad St and Hood Rd in Barry, as well as Barry Memo Arts Centre. This is not a time to be complacent - a rise in COVID-19 hospital admissions would put our services at significant risk.

The hard work doesn't stop here, this World Patient Safety Day we're hosting a virtual Quality, Safety and Experience Event, and a range of online seminars for staff on patient safety topics. These will help us develop our vision for the future. I'd encourage staff members across the Health Board to take advantage of these opportunities. ### Significant technology investment for NHS Wales' intensive care patients

Hospitals in Wales are to benefit from a new high-tech digital-monitoring system for seriously ill people in intensive care units following a £13 million technology investment.

Following a pledge by Minister for Health and Social Services, Vaughan Gething, to accelerate digital improvements for critical care, the NHS Wales Informatics Service has signed a £13 million contract with the supplier ASCOM.

The seven-year agreement for ASCOM's Digistat software delivers a managed service and provides a technical platform to develop the all-Wales Intensive Care Information System. Funding is provided by Welsh Government, Health Boards and the Critical Care Trauma Network.

With increasing pressure on intensive care services, the new system will reduce administrative pressures placed on NHS Wales staff and will free-up more time for patient care. More than 10,000 people are admitted for critical care in Welsh hospitals each year.

Automation will make real-time information available across a range of devices, forming part of the patient's digital patient record, streamlining care processes.

Information will also be collated in a dynamic database, which can also be used to benchmark against other healthcare systems and provide a platform for research and potential implementation of artificial intelligence-driven improvements in daily care.

### Virtual Hearth Gallery launched

I was very excited to see the Health Board's arts team launch the Virtual Hearth Gallery. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Hearth Gallery sadly had to close. However, now, as we look at beginning to safely open the physical space again we also must pay consideration to those who will not be able to visit it in person.

The Virtual Hearth Gallery is a new, online space for people to enjoy the fantastic pieces contributed by our network of artists from the safety and comfort of their own home.

The virtual space also works to make the gallery even more inclusive as it is accessible to hospital inpatients in sites other than University Hospital Llandough as well as those unable to leave their wards.

The virtual gallery is hosted on an online platform, which allows users to move around a 3-dimensional space with full control. Instructions on how to move around can be found each time you enter the virtual space.


### James Sommerin book supporting our Health Charity
