This has been another strong week for our Mass Vaccination Programme, as we have now passed 25,000 vaccinations. We continue to make good progress working through the JCVI priority groups one and two, with more than 13,000 frontline healthcare workers from Cardiff and Vale UHB and various partner organisations working on our patch, protecting our frontline from COVID-19 so that we can continue to care for our community. Numbers of over 80s receiving their vaccination are really starting to accelerate, with around 3,500 now vaccinated with the first dose. You can keep track of progress on our website.

This great progress is testament to the tireless work of our team delivering the vaccination programme across our sites, with all GP practices across the area now also on board and making an important contribution to our efforts. We have also been taken aback by the remarkable number of people showing an interest in supporting the roll out of the vaccination programme, whether to deliver vaccinations, help the booking centre, or support recipients of the vaccine. If you have put yourself forward and have yet to hear back, please be assured that the team will be in touch to guide your through the process as quickly as is possible.

In further positive news, we are starting to see the positive impact that lockdown is having on the number of cases of COVID-19 in the community. While it is reassuring to see things now moving in the right direction and we are starting to see admissions level off, services across the Health Board remain exceptionally busy. We are currently able to continue urgent cardiac surgery, and cancer treatment, however staff across our organisation are exhausted, critical care is still significantly constrained and elective surgery remains postponed. We must avoid even the smallest sense of complacency, which could see us move towards critical levels of pressure on our services.

For those who have received the vaccine, it's important to be aware that some people are likely to have mild infections of COVID-19 even after receiving the vaccine, and that they could still pass the virus to those they come into contact with. All of us must continue to observe the COVID-19 restrictions so that we can continue moving in a positive direction and to protect those around us, by wearing the correct PPE as required by your role, regularly washing your hands, maintaining a two-metre distance, and wearing a face covering as necessary

First Specialist Neurofibromatosis Nurse for Wales appointed

I am delighted to announce that Cardiff and Vale UHB is now host to the first ever Specialist Neurofibromatosis Nurse for Wales. Based at our UHW site and with support from Nerve Tumours UK's Specialist NF Nurse based in Liverpool, Helen Swann will have a national remit to the support patients living in Wales who are affected by the neuro-genetic condition.

Unknown to many, Neurofibromatosis (NF) affects more than 26,500 people across the UK and is one of the most common neuro-genetic conditions causing tumours to grow on nerve endings. Often inoperable and sometimes fatal, these tumours can be painful and can interfere with crucial neurological pathways. Therefore, early diagnosis and intervention are crucial for this very complex and varied condition, ensuring patients receive adequate and appropriate lifelong care.

Helen has commenced working with Jennifer Gardner, Consultant Geneticist at the University Hospital to enhance and expand the support network for families and patients with Neurofibromatosis throughout Wales. I'd like to wish her every success in the new role, I'm sure the availability of the new service will be of huge relief and comfort to patients and families affected by NF.

Video Consultations

With the COVID-19 pandemic continuing to put pressure on the NHS and the ongoing need to facilitate social distancing to help prevent the spread of the virus, we're continuing to expand our Video Consultation service, so that patients across an increasing number of our services are able to attend their appointments flexibly from home or at work, minimising the amount of time they need to take out of their day.

The service remains popular with our patients and continues to grow. Last week, we held 1,116 video consultations – a 15 per cent increase on our previous weekly record, which we achieved the week before. In total, we've now held around 17,000 consultations, which adds up to more than 175,000 miles of travel saved for our patients, and almost 50 tons of CO2 emissions avoided.

We're asking departments across the Health Board to continue considering new ways that they could use video consultations could support and enhance service provision. There is dedicated resource to support services using the Health Board's preferred video consultation platform, Attend Anywhere, with a range of training, on-boarding, reporting and technical support, accessible through a simple new online form available through the intranet.

Recovery & Wellbeing College Launches Spring Term Prospectus

Cardiff and Vale Recovery & Wellbeing College is excited to announce the launch of its Spring Term Prospectus, offering 17 free courses on a range of mental health and wellbeing topics. Courses available this term include; Understanding Anxiety, Men and Mental Health, Trauma Informed, Fighting Fit for Recovery and many more.

The Recovery & Wellbeing College is underpinned by the principles of co-production and recovery, is flexible, education-focused and has the promotion of wellbeing at its core. All of the courses on offer are co-produced by people with lived experience of mental health issues and mental health professionals.

The initiative has been a huge success for the Health Board since it came to fruition in September 2020. In its first term, the Recovery & Wellbeing College offered 12 courses, had 298 enrolments and delivered over 103 hours of teaching. This term, with 17 courses available, a growing team and an expanding network of excellent partnerships with the Third Sector, the Recovery & Wellbeing College will continue to offer more choice to its students.

Courses are available to individuals who are currently using or have used mental health services, their carers, all Health Board staff, or people working in mental health in the Local Authority and Charitable sectors. Anyone who enrols on a course signs up as a student and is welcomed to the college to learn, aiding their understanding and awareness of mental health issues, and subsequently supporting recovery.

Anyone who may be apprehensive about enrolling with the Recovery & Wellbeing College are encouraged to reach out to the friendly team for an informal conversation to help ease any reservations. There are also a series of insight videos on our YouTube playlist that will give you a feel for what it's like to be a student, how the courses are co-produced and what makes the college so different.

Rapid NGS Diagnostic Virtual Workshop

The role of Next Generation Sequencing (NGS) in clinical diagnostics of patients with rare genetic diseases over the past decade has been transformative, and I am proud to see Wales leading the way in genomics. Currently the All Wales Medical Genomics Service (AWMGS) is the only NHS authority offering rapid whole genome NGS to sick children as part of their WINGS study.

This conference will bring together experts in rapid NGS from all areas of the UK and Ireland to share their experiences of setting up such a clinical service and to build best practices to allow national standards to be applied. The event will be free to attend.
