I want to start by paying tribute to our colleague Dr Gary Jenkins.

Dr Gary Jenkins was a dedicated and committed doctor who was proud to work in the NHS. We are devastated by the traumatic and horrific circumstances in which his life was taken and we stand against homophobia in any guise. I hope the verdict yesterday at least brings some comfort to his family, friends and colleagues that justice has been served.

We want Dr Gary Jenkins to be remembered as the professional he was, committed to doing the best for his patients with kindness and integrity.

Stonewall have organised a vigil to pay respects to Dr Gary Jenkins, on behalf of the communities of Cardiff this Sunday 6th February at 5.30pm on the steps of the National Museum in Cardiff, CF10 3NP.

We appreciate the last few weeks, and in fact months have been an extremely distressing time while the trial to get justice for Gary has been played out publically. As a UHB we stand against violence, aggression and discrimination of anyone and if you are a victim of a hate crime please report it and seek support.

Mass Vaccination Centres

Our Mass Vaccination Centres provide a safe environment space to maintain social distancing while allowing more people to be vaccinated as efficiently and as quickly as possible. Whilst some people have been unable to attend vaccine appointments, the daily service at our Mass Vaccination Centres give you the opportunity to receive your first, second and booster doses without the need for an appointment. The Centres are located at Bayside, Splott and Holm View, where you can turn up without the need for an appointment.

If you are aged 16 and over you can walk into any centre but children aged 12-15 can only attend Bayside and must be accompanied by an adult.

COVID-19 Operational Update

There has been a slight rise in overall PCR rates in the last week which has been driven primarily by cases among under 19s although cases in schoolage children have started to fall in the last 5 days.

There continues to be a heightened level of pressure across our system, with high occupancy remaining the driver behind current challenges. Admissions to the Emergency Unit are also slowly continuing to increase, and volumes of suspected COVID-19 attendances remain high but hospital admission is starting to decrease. Whilst the IP&C position has stabilised, norovirus, flu and COVID-19 are circulating within communities and are having an impact on capacity.

Working with colleagues and partners, we are agreeing an approach and actions to help to alleviate pressures on the system, workforce position and expediate discharges.

I would like to thank you all for your continued hard work, commitment and professionalism during challenging times. If you or one of your



colleagues or team members require any further support, please take advantage of the support from <u>Employee Health & Wellbeing Services</u> or raise any concerns with your line manager.

As the picture with flu is looking slightly different this year to previous winters, we strongly encourage colleagues to take up their flu vaccination to protect patients, themselves, their families and the communities we serve. The CAV Team vaccination rate is lower than in previous years which is a concern and since it is an important part of the strategy to support everyone's safety, health and wellbeing I would really encourage unvaccinated colleagues to give it some serious thought. Transnasal Endoscopy trial underway

A project is underway, lead by Dr Hasan Haboubi, Consultant Gastroenterologist in Cardiff and Vale, and Dr Dai Samuel, Consultant Hepatologist in Cwm Taf Morgannwg, to deploy Olympus gastroscopes in dual site transnasal endoscopy (TNE) clinics. The six-month trial will test and demonstrate the value of TNE in a Welsh health context.

Endoscopy is particularly valuable in identifying pre-cancerous lesions (collection of cells from the body's organs that may look and appear to be the same as cancer cells) and early forms of cancer where the tumour can be amenable to curative treatment. The trial is funded by Moondance Cancer Initiative and aims to better cancer outcomes in Wales.

TNE is an upper gastrointestinal endoscopy method performed via the nose instead of the traditional method through the mouth, using a thinner endoscope. The practice has been adopted in some hospitals in England and widely in Scotland but is not yet in use in Wales.

The Moondance Cancer Imitative finds, funds, and fuels brilliant people and brave ideas to make Wales a world leader in cancer survival.

Megan Mathias, Chief Executive at Moondance Cancer Initiative, said "We believe that innovations like TNE create a significant opportunity to transform early diagnosis & detection of cancer in Wales. Through this project, Hasan Haboubi and Dai Samuel are leading the way in demonstrating that TNE has a place going forward in our diagnostic pathways".

Kickstart employees secure permanent positions

Since introducing the scheme in 2020, we have supported over 140 young people to access part-time employment for six months, helping them gain experience and skills to secure a job in the future.

We've recently appointed Kickstart employee, Louis Milton as a Band 4 Data Administrator and Support Officer following a placement with us. Having joined Cardiff and Vale University Health Board in June 2021 Louis provided invaluable support to the PCIC team as he helped with the management of the centralised waiting list and mid-morning emergencies for the dental team.

Louis was helping on a part-time basis to manage the centralised waiting list and midmorning emergency appointments.

Commenting on his new position, Louis said: "I am very thankful for the Kickstart Scheme. This initiative and experience have resulted in me securing a full-time, permanent Band 4 position, doing a role I really enjoy and with a team that I feel a part of. The scheme gave me the opportunity to learn and develop my skill set and opened the door to permanent employment. I am looking forward to starting my new role and continuing to support the dental team within the PCIC clinical board."

Jane Brown, Head of Dental and Optometry at Cardiff and Vale University Health Board, commented: "Louis' positive approach to work and his passionate ethic was instrumental to our team. He was keen to support and help our team during our busiest periods. As his contract was approaching its end, we requested an extension for a short period of time, and raised concerns about losing a person in post who had proven to be a valuable resource."
