Dear Colleague,

To date we have delivered 87,990 vaccines across Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan which is a huge achievement. We are on target to have offered a vaccination to all people in the priority groups 1-4 by the end of the week.

Our GP Practices have been incredible in their rollout by holding clinics over the weekend to ensure the majority of the population aged 75+ receive their first dose and the opening of our third Mass Vaccination Centre at Holm View Leisure Centre in Barry will certainly increase our capacity.

There may be some occasions where we have missed getting to someone in these groups, as they have changed address or telephone number so if you fall under the following groups and have NOT yet been contacted please get in touch so we can book you in:

- Age 75 and over: contact your GP Practice
- 75 and over and clinically extremely vulnerable/shielding: contact your GP Practice
- Age 70-74: contact the booking centre on 029 2184 1234
- Age 74 and under and clinically extremely vulnerable/shielding: contact the booking centre on 029 2184 1234
- Aged 70 and over AND housebound: contact the booking centre on 029 2184 1234

We are expecting a decrease in supply of the vaccines during the weeks commencing 15th February and 22nd February so we are looking at our delivery over these weeks.

From 14th February we will be using our supply of Pfizer vaccine for second doses only. Therefore we will start vaccinating people with their second doses of the Pfizer vaccine from 15th February at our Mass Vaccination Centre in Splott. You do not need to contact us for your second dose appointment if it has not already been scheduled as you will be contacted to attend.

Our supplies of Oxford AstraZeneca are also expected to be lower over these two weeks with just 7,500 available on 15 February and 5,500 available on 22 February.

GP Practices will now start to schedule in priority group 5 (aged 65-69) to attend their GP Practice and people in priority groups 6 and 7 (underlying health conditions and aged 60-64) will start to receive invitations to one of our Mass Vaccination Centres in Pentwyn or Barry.

Therefore the number of vaccinations delivered over these weeks will be lower but we are expecting a significant increase in vaccine supply from 1st March.

The vaccination programme is the largest mass vaccination programme the NHS has ever delivered so we have a dedicated web page which is regularly updated with FAQs, Myth Busters, news stories and data so you can keep up to date with what is happening across Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan. I would like to thank the public for their patience while we work at pace to deliver this programme to protect our population and also thank our staff for their unwavering commitment and dedication to supporting this delivery.

Cardiff and Vale UHB leads UK in world's largest ICU oxygen trial

We have recently led in the UK, the largest ever research trial looking at how patients are treated with oxygen in ICU (Intensive Care Units). Patients with acute hypoxemic respiratory failure in ICU are commonly treated with supplemental oxygen, but the benefits and harms of different oxygen targets have been unclear.

The study which ran in a number of ICU sites across the UK found that among adult patients with acute hypoxemic respiratory failure, a lower oxygen target did not result in lower mortality than a higher target at 90 days. Since the conclusion of the study, the research has been published in the highly respected New England Journal of Medicine. The results of the study are timely in the midst of the current pandemic. Given that COVID-19 is a respiratory disease and critically ill patients often require the support of oxygen, the results of this study will be used to further guide oxygen use.

We are so proud of contributions to research we make at Cardiff and Vale UHB, on both a national and international level. It is so important to be part of research that will have a tangible impact on healthcare on the world stage. I'd like to pass on my sincere thanks and congratulations to the whole team for continuing to push the boundaries of what we know in the interest of patient care.



The IPC moral challenge – Risks costs lives



National Apprenticeship Week

We launched our Apprenticeship Academy in conjunction with our signing of the pledge to the Cardiff Commitment which sees us working in partnership with schools and education providers to connect children and young adults to the vast range of opportunities available in the NHS.

For many students leaving school, the traditional routes into further education are not appealing, they are looking for opportunities which will allow them to gain 'hands on' paid work experience whilst completing a qualification which compliments their role.

A number of departments from the across the UHB have successfully appointed apprentices who have gone on to gain roles at the end of the 12 months. The feedback from line managers has been extremely positive, some remarking that this has been a rewarding experience and one which they would repeat if the opportunity arose.

We are aiming to increase the opportunities for apprenticeships across the service to fill skills gaps, bring fresh perspectives and create a pipeline of talent for the UHB. Thank you to everyone involved in this programme of work, including our fantastic apprentices, for all your efforts.

Work concludes on the UHW Lakeside Wing

Significant Milestone for Video Consultations

Last week, our Video Consultation passed an incredible milestone as we estimate that it has now prevented more than 200,000 miles of patient travel to attend around 10,000 hours of hospital appointments.

The NHS Wales Video Consultation Service has been a real success since its introduction in April last year, enabling patients to attend their hospital appointment via video from the comfort of their own home or without having to leave work. It has played a significant role in many of our services being able to continue seeing patients throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, and by limiting the number of people on site has helped to facilitate social distancing.

There was a new record set for the number for consultations held every week during January, culminating in 1,146 video consultations being held in the last week of the month. It adds up to fewer journeys to and from our sites for patients, which as well as being more convenient is of real benefit to the environment too. We estimate that around 56 tonnes of CO2 emissions have been prevented since April.

We've long been planning to introduce video consultations as an option to offer healthcare sustainably, closer to people's homes. We know that they don't suit all circumstances, but our clinicians are still exploring how we can get the best out of them, driving forward a valuable service for as many patient groups as possible. Through our digital strategy I'm looking forward to seeing where this exciting work will take us.

New Blood Cancer Clinical Trials Announced

On World Cancer Day last week, it was announced that Cardiff and Vale UHB will be delivering new clinical trials for blood cancer patients in south Wales, as part of the Trials Acceleration Programme (TAP).

The Health Board is one of 12 centres across the UK that form the TAP Network, funded by blood cancer charity, Cure Leukaemia to deliver clinical trials that aim to transform outcomes for patients with blood cancer.

These new trials are excellent news for people with blood cancer, and send a clear message that despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, we remain committed to undertaking research activity to identify and assess promising new treatments That's something that remains incredibly important because access to pioneering treatments through clinical trials such as these can give hope to patients who in some cases may have otherwise exhausted all of the existing treatment options available to them.

Our Research and Development department is funded by Welsh Government through Health and Care Research Wales, which works in partnership with the NHS, universities and stakeholders to fund, support and increase life changing research.
