Referral Criteria for the AAC hub. (Extracted from the AAC Service Specification)

2.1.4 The criteria for referral to the specialised AAC aspect of the EAT Service Wales

- Each individual will have been assessed by the local Spoke level service, where Spoke services are in place. Where Spoke services are in development and/or are not fully operational it is expected that individuals will have been assessed by a registered healthcare professional e.g. local Speech and Language Therapist (SLT) or Occupational Therpaist (OT). In the case of Service Users with a rapidly progressing condition (see section 2.2) direct referral from any registered healthcare professional may be permitted.
- An individual who would access a specialist AAC service would have the following:
 - A complex communication need associated with a range of physical, cognitive and/or learning disabilities and/or sensory loss.

In addition, an individual must:

- be able to understand the purpose of an AAC system;
- have the intrinsic intent and ability to communicate;

2.1.4.1 Exclusion criteria:

Not all individuals may be eligible for AAC services. The Following exclusion criteria will apply:

• Have impaired cognitive abilities that would specifically prevent the Service User from retaining information on how to use a complex high tech AAC system.

2.1.5 Access Criteria/Rationale

The overarching criteria for referral to the services are as follows:

- The Service User is permanently resident in Wales or whose GP practice is in Wales and who lives within a CCG bordering Wales; and
- Initial referral must originate from a registered health care professional, using the EAT Service single point referral form,
