## Notes from the Chair

It is important to have a representative from each hospital, particularly in order to discuss future developments of the peripheral clinics. It is also important to spread the word to other members of your team involved in the care of children with kidney disease e.g. dieticians, nurses who are welcome to attend these meetings.

It has gone rather quiet on the WHSSC front. There have been a number of personnel changes in their organisation and we are continuing to try and secure the intended financial investment in our service. This will hopefully allow us to increase the service we can deliver through our peripheral clinics.

We are pleased to announce that funding has been secured from Kidney Wales for a dedicated renal psychologist. This service was lost following the retirement of Anna Brazier and this appointment should improve the support we can give patients and their families, particularly those living outside Cardiff.

You may also be interested to learn that it has been decided to try and rationalise the protocols used by the centres undertaking paediatric renal transplantation. At present each unit has their own protocol and this is an important development. When the final details are sorted out it will be posted on the website. Obviously it does not have a direct impact on us as our transplants are carried out in England but it is a step forward in being able to look at outcomes.
