Transition to adult care

As I have mentioned above, we plan to use our Study Day this year to look at this topic. We have now held our second young adult clinic in Morriston Hospital, in the newly refurbished adult renal department.

Our ability to address the needs of these patients has been greatly enhanced in the last 3 years by the appointment of a Renal Youth Worker, Shaun Thomas. He works between Cardiff and Swansea and if anyone thinks he can

Research

Dr Shiv Hegde presented the results of the PREDNOS study, which involved children from Wales, at the meeting in November.

We are currently recruiting patients for the ECUSTEC study looking at the early administration of eculizumab in diarrhoea-associated HUS. Patients with suspected HUS should be discussed promptly with the appropriate paediatric nephrology centre to fulfil study requirements.

The NephroS study is collecting data and clinical samples on patients with idiopathic nephrotic syndrome whether steroid sensitive or resistant. This is purely a genetic study trying to identify genes associated with idiopathic nephrotic syndrome. It is important we recruit as many children as possiblke in order to add power to the study.
